TITLE: Parables – stories to live by: The Pharisee and The Tax Collector PASSAGE: Luke 18:10-14

Leaders Notes:

- Please use these questions as conversation starters to aid discussions. Please don't feel obligated to go through all the questions.
- After the reading I always like to consider asking 'what immediately stands out in the passage?'

Introduction

A parable is a fictitious story told by Jesus to help people understand important messages regarding aspects of faith.

Read scripture Luke 18:10-14

Discussion starters

- 1. When you consider the Pharisee and how he behaved how would you describe his attitude towards himself and others (in the temple and professionally)?
- 2. When you consider the Tax collector and how he behaved how would you describe his attitude towards himself and others (in the temple and professionally)?
- 3. If you put yourself in the shoes of the listener, who might they have thought was 'right' before God (prior to Jesus' explanation) and why?
- 4. What do you think was the specific sin/s of the Pharisee in the Temple?
- 5. Jesus was a guest of Zacchaeus and a friend of Matthew. What does this tell us Jesus' attitude to Tax collectors? Why was this so different from the Pharisee/s?
- 6. It might be easy for us to despise the Pharisee for his treatment of the tax collector, but how should we as Christians react to this, what would be a Godly response?
- 7. Read Isaiah 64:6 *All of us have become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous acts are like filthy rags; we all shrivel up like a leaf, and like the wind our sins sweep us away.* How do you interpret this verse? Does it apply to us as believers? (discuss)

8. Read verse Luke 10:14 *For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.* How might this bring comfort to us believers?

Pray:

Pray that we don't become self-righteous or prideful.

Pray God will strengthen us to have mercy and compassion and not to judge.

Pray we become more like Christ in all aspects of our daily lives.
